Things that may be unique to a culture include: language, religion, food, music, clothing, celebrations, and much more.






We have been exploring our personal strengths as part of our Term 1 topic. Here is an activity we completed to share four of our strengths and a strength we are working on.

We are incredibly proud of the Year 5 students for their positive attitude and mature approach towards their recent NAPLAN tests. We congratulate them on their efforts.

As part of our integrated unit that inquires into society and respectful relationships, we recently visited the State Library to participate in the *Big Ideas, Young Minds* program. This inspiring experience encouraged our students to reflect on how they can become active participants in their community and society. Through engaging discussions and thought-provoking activities, students explored the importance of civic responsibility, respect, and collaboration.



#### In the Year 6 Pod

The Year 6 Pod has been exploring the inquiry topic 'What makes a leader?' this term. As role models of the student body, the Year 6 students looked at the roles and responsibilities of leaders throughout history, analysing and researching what qualities these people had, and what they, as leaders of the school, need to represent.

The Year 6s have started to take on leadership roles such as school captains, house captains and junior school council members. Some students have taken up roles that support the wellbeing of the school, taking ownership and responsibility of the school environment.





This term, students had a great time learning about portraiture through iconic paintings and works from last year's Young Archies exhibition. We focused on the idea of how our faces can tell our stories. Students began the project by building their observation skills and learning a range of drawing techniques to create their richly coloured and detailed self portraits. It was wonderful to see the creative thinking and expressiveness they used to describe themselves. Congratulations on a wonderful body of work.





This term, the Year 6s have been learning about the properties of solids, liquids and gases. They have been conducting experiments, and recorded their observations when they mixed bicarb soda with tartaric acid in water. This resulted in a new gas being released, enough to fill up a balloon!
